

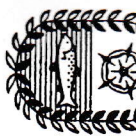

## Mid Northants Competition Rules

- 1) All competitors must be fully paid up MNTFA members.
- 2) All competitions will be fished to reservoir rules. I.E. rules applicable to the venue.
- 3) In all competitions, start, finish and weigh in times must be adhered to. The start and finish times for all competitions will be signaled by the competition timekeeper. You are advised to synchronise your watch to the starting sound. Boats must not leave the bank or jetty before the start and must be in contact with the same at the finishing time. In the event of a bank match finishing time will be at the lodge.
- 4) If one of a pair of competitors is unable to fish a substitute MNTFA member may take his place in the competition. Should a replacement be a non member then the boat may be taken out but they will not fish in the competition.
- 5) If two anglers weigh in the same weight, the winner will be the angler with the highest number of fish. If the result is still tied the trophy will be shared for equal lengths of time.
- 6) Anyone reaching a limit catch for the competition will be awarded a weight bonus for each remaining 15 minute period of half a pound. ( This only applies to club Eliminators ).
- 7) Disputes and Appeals: All objections must be made as soon as practicable and in any case before the results are announced and presentations made. Objections will be settled by committee members present. Their majority decision will be final.
- 8) Competitors must possess a current rod licence.
- 9) International rules will apply to MNTFA club eliminators.

# Cyril's Lemonade

## Materials :

- lime green syntho
- brown syntho
- finegold wire
- brown hen hackle
- lime green floss
- black tying thread
- hooks 10's and 12's

## Method of Tying :

Commence a third from the eye with lime floss. Catch in wire rib. Carry on down to bend of hook. Return up hook with floss to starting point. Using the loop twist method dub with lime green dubbing. Twist then wind down the hook in tight turns. Catch in with wire rib leaving surplus dubbing hanging at rear. Wind up through the dubbed body. Catch in wire with black tying thread and cut off surplus wire.

Catch in the hackle and make three turns, pass thread through hackle. Again using loop twist on the brown syntho make the head secure by twisting thread through the dubbed head, make a few turns and tie off in the usual way (don't forget the waxing of the thread).

## How/where to fish :

This fly is good for bottom feeding fish in the margins at Pitsford from late June to the start of October. Fished slow to static in 6 feet to 10 feet of water it imitates the natural caddis.

Slower the retrieve the better the catch !

## Beginners Tuition At Pitsford

Anglian Water run a number of beginners courses throughout the year with fly fishing experts Henry Lowe and our own Hector Woolnough. These cover fish behaviour, angling tactics and tackle - but their most important element is learning to cast and present your fly. By the end of the afternoon you should be casting well enough to cover your first trout - and hopefully to land one. Tackle and coffee are provided and lunch is available at the lodge for a modest charge.

Prices are Adults £25.00, Juniors £16.00 and they have a minimum age of 12. The tuition dates at Pitsford this year are :

The beginners weeks at Pitsford this year are 3rd to 9th April and 24th to 31st July. During these weeks Anglian Water offer free instruction between 10am and 3pm to anyone buying a Beginners Permit, which costs 5.00 per day. Tackle hire is 6.00, excluding flies.

***Don't forget that the one fish Beginners Permit is available throughout the season to any inexperienced angler.***

## HOW TO FISH - Rutland

The secret to all fishing is go when conditions are good, when the climate is stable and the wind direction has been steady for a few days. Good up to date reports from the reservoirs on a Monday night at the Pioneer.

However, it is not always possible for me to cover six months of fishing on the bank and boat in the allotted space, so I will suggest my preference.

The start of the season would be spent on the bank, fish are always close in and the car is never far away for shelter or a quick move to find the fish, always move around and explore the water. If you prefer nymph fishing keep a lure rod set up ready to cover a large fish which may move into your area for a short spell of feeding on bait fish. Early mornings at Rutland on the bank will pay off for the determined angler. The biggest tip to any angler at the start of the season from my experience, be vigilant in the last ten foot of your retrieve. I catch 50% of my fish from the bank in this zone. Remember the induced take.

Once we get into May I like to go afloat, decide with your partner your approach to the day, form a plan. it will change, but have a plan. Agree on tactics, work together as a team even in competitions it will pay off. A relaxed boat will fish far better than a boat at loggerheads.

South arm? North arm? Main Bowl? who knows. Ask around, find out what has been happening and crucially what time it's happening. Choose a few areas within easy motoring and keep moving until you get a response. Remember boat fishing will be on fast sinking lines and sometimes you just can't get deep enough, these lines are hard work and not until July and August will the fish be coming up in the water.

However, I have found the Wet II to be an alternative to the heavier lines and always catches fish especially if drifting in the shallower bays. I always go for three flies, black, green, white, orange etc. the crucial thing is the leader dimensions and the fly positions make it do something different. If you can stay on after 6pm, more fish will be caught as the wind eases, the sun sets and the fish move up in the water.

July, August, September, now the best fishing will be available. The fish will be fitter and feeding higher in the water. Wet flies and nymphs, intermediates and floaters, accurate presentation and all the action and response of the trout can be seen, the most exciting fishing. Long drifts and artistic dabling with heart stopping responses. The long drifts will find the fish and then it's time to settle into cracking the best method of presentation. Careful motoring back up wind to set the next drift accurately and slight alteration to the cast in fly size and pattern can have dramatic results.

In the final months the fishing will usually end with the fry bonanza, more on this another time.

## HOW TO FISH - Pitsford

Hector Woolhough fishes mostly DRY (if fish are to be seen) or STATIC (drifting) if conditions allow. LURES if fished are generally to slow sinking lines from boats or dam walls: Lures and large food items fished dry are usually on hook size L/S 10, remainder on standard 10/12. In seasons of normal water levels try as follows:

**April/May:** Flies: Nymph: Black Chiro, Orange gills: Lure: Green Pea, Viva, Montana, Brown or dark Damselfly: Black/Brown Rats Tail.

Bank : Northfields, Stone Barn, Firs, Pistford Creek, Sailing Club Bay and all long bank to concrete post, Gorse, Pig Stream, Duffers,.....

Boat say at 30 yards.

**June/July/August:** Flies: Nymph: GRHE, Sedge Pupa, Ph Tail. Lure: All orange, Olive Damselfly. Dry: GAS, OFB, Emergers green and orange, Double knot sedge.

Bank: Stone Barn, Gravels, Holly, Stumps, Firs, Cone Pipe, Yacht Club, No Fish Bay.

Boat: Stone Barn, Holly, Firs, North Shore, Brixworth Bay.

**Sept/Oct:** Flies: Nymph: GRHE. Lure: White Minkie, Muddler. Dry: Floating Fry and variants, Wandering snail, Corixa.

Bank: Bog Bay Point, Stone Barn, Pistford Creek, Sailing Club Bay, Holly, Concrete Post, Brixworth Bay, No Fish Point, Three trees, North end of Res, all concrete road, May Tree.

Boats: for last anchor and fish into or out from weeds, chase activity in North end within limits.

Watch out for OLIVE hatches, try DRY Greenwells, Rough Olive, Red Spinner.

## HOW TO FISH - Ravensthorpe

Approx 100 years old and approx 100 acres in size. Despite what Blagdon say - Ravensthorpe is the oldest stocked man made reservoir in England.

The fishing is now a two fish limit using barbless hooks - no boobies.

**Early Spring** The water is often coloured to some extent for the first few weeks and I find that flashy flies ( silver, gold, appetizers ) work well when fished quite close together no more than three feet apart. From a boat - slow sink lines i.e. slime or Wet Cel I fished medium to slow.

Floating lines swung round in the breeze figure of eight retrieve is lethal. From the bank - floaters or sink-tip are great. Sinking lines do not work well.

**Early Summer (June, July + August)** The reservoir comes into it's own fishing imitative patterns i.e. damselfly (light or dark green and brown), gold rib hares ears and slim tied black

and peacock spider, diawl bach, small nymphs, in fact any nymphs are

great. My set up - June leader, long cast floating line, damselfly on the point, hares ear in the middle and black and peacock spider at the top - you wouldn't need to change your flies all day.

**Autumn (Sept, Oct + Nov)** Early Sept, dry flies are great (hopper, daddies and emergers). Not a very good response to fry feeding, they will take white and silver flies pulled fast on a slime line.

Rowing or outboard electric only. My favourite reservoir is Ravensthorpe. Last years best was an 8lb 12oz and two 5lb plus rainbows in four casts.

Biggest bag in one day was 47 trout of which 45 were returned.

## HOW TO FISH - Grafham

This 1000 acre water is best divided into four seasonal areas, otherwise it can be daunting.

**Early Season.** Head off in an easterly direction out of the boat dock and turn right. After some few minutes ( seems like forever ) you will arrive at the Dam. To the left is the shallow end, a good productive area up to the Willows. Anchor up April/early May, Booby/Nymph combinations a fairly safe bet, nice smooth bottom. If this is unproductive move up to the most famous mark on the water, Marker Bouy G (every chuck a coconut, well sometimes!). While down this end of the Reservoir the other end of the Dam is always worth a try, make sure you have a long anchor rope as it is quite deep here. Gaynes Cove is up from the Dam - Lodge side - and often provides comfortable fishing when it is windy and occasionally a fish.

When all else fails, I like to try the Wheatshaf in Perry. Warm, dry, comfortable and foods good. As a general rule the Dam end is good into May/early June with not much else worth trying.

**Mid June Onwards.** The North Shore - somewhere near the Artic Circle? -, behind the tower, Hedge End, G Marker G - better get the map out. All these areas are good on the drift and if you are brave enough out in the middle from the Tower towards the Lodge. Orange this, Cats Whisker that, Whickams and if the weathers right, dries of all sorts. This is Grafhams best time. Fish almost everywhere.

**July/August/September.** Big Lures down deep, big muddlers on top. No area is really better than anywhere else but out in the middle where not many people bother to try. When conditions are right wet fly and dries work well as anything.

**Mid September onwards.** Big fish time, fry feeders round the tower, Savages and the boat dock if you get up early enough. Very exciting stuff! Good luck and good fishing. For further info ring **Julian Davies** on 01604 636723.
